DIAL UP the ANDY GRIFFITH MUSEUM

Don't miss the recently displayed candlestick phone! The phone was used as a prop in the Mayberry Courthouse on *The Andy Griffith Show* during at least its first five seasons, and likely during the final three seasons as well. Set decorator Ken Swartz sold the phone from his collection during a prop sale in Van Nuys, California, on July 5, 1977. It was subsequently purchased at auction by a group of fans for donation to the Andy Griffith Museum. Construction has begun to ready the Andy Griffith Museum for the newly designed exhibits. Installation is scheduled for early 2017. Watch the website for details. Cases will mimic storefronts from Mayberry with the Mayberry Courthouse being the centerpiece. There is a large audio-visual component that will feature many of Andy's movies, songs, clips from shows, photos, and other aspects of his life. The new Betty Lynn exhibit was unveiled on her 90th birthday, August 29, 2016. The hallway is covered with memorabilia and a new television displays over 350 photos of her life. This part of the exhibit remains a work in progress. The Mayberry-Mount Airy exhibit has been upgraded and has a new home in the photo gallery adjacent to the Betty Lynn exhibit.

The Andy Griffith Playhouse has new seats and has been painted. The lobby has been updated with new photos and will soon have the television with photos of Andy's life. There has been a lot added to the backstage area and Backstage Tours now have more information and things to see. Abigail is working on labels for all of the photos and memorabilia which will enhance the experience. All remains a work in progress but much has been done.
